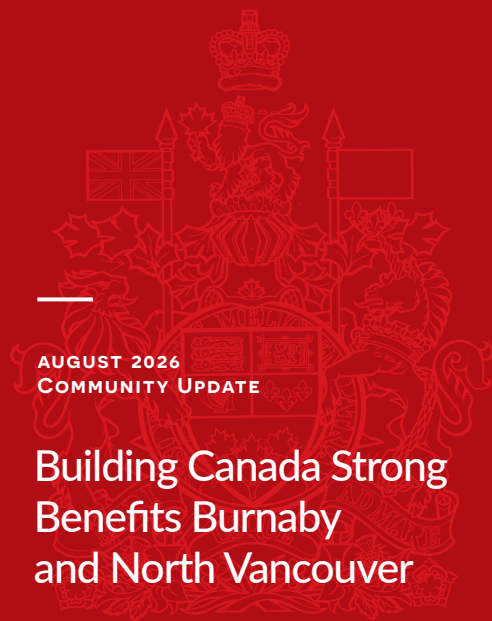

It was a valuable opportunity to learn more about the project and discuss the long-term benefits it can bring to Canadians for generations to come.

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Dear Friends and Neighbours,

This summer has been a historic one. Canada had an amazing performance in the Men’s FIFA World Cup. We secured our first-ever tournament point by beating Qatar 6-0 in Vancouver. Vancouver was named the best host city and we advanced to the group stage for the first time and to the Round of 16. Unfortunately, those historic highs have been matched with historic lows for those communities directly affected by wildfires. Another year of record high temperatures and significant wildfires led to the evacuation of Summerland and reached as close to home as Belcarra Regional Park. A big thanks to our local firefighters in North Vancouver and Burnaby who protect us here at home and abroad as they serve our province and beyond. It’s a reminder that a strong economy requires a strong plan to fight climate change and to protect our environment. The focus in Ottawa remains on growing the Canadian economy, diversifying trade and improving affordability. Federal government operational spending is being reduced to allow for increased investments in economic infrastructure. While exports to the US fell last year by 3.7%, exports to the rest of the world increased by more than 11%. This has reduced our US export ratio to lows not seen in more than four decades. Non-US exports are now 32.8% of global trade and rising. This growth has been primarily based in Europe and Asia. Foreign investment grew to \$96.8 billion, the highest since 2007, and puts us on track to hit our half-trillion-dollar target.

In B.C., those investments include the North Coast Transmission Line. This will power B.C. companies in the Golden Triangle including Seabridge’s KSM mine. This single project is the world’s largest undeveloped gold mine and one of the world’s largest undeveloped gold-copper deposits. This project will create 1,800 construction jobs and over 1,000 permanent jobs that will last for generations. The mine’s gold, copper, and silver resources represent one of the most valuable undeveloped mineral deposits in the world. I had the opportunity to visit the site with representatives of the company and partner First Nations as we explore new ways to build pathways to success for future generations. Lowering Food Cost

The National Food Security Strategy
More choice. More control. More Canada.

Despite being one of the largest producers of agri-food products in the world, Canadians continue to face some of the highest grocery costs in the G7. There is not enough competition between grocery retailers, we are not harnessing enough technology, and our food chains rely too heavily on foreign suppliers.

That is why our government is launching the first-ever **National Food Security Strategy**, backed by more than \$3 billion in investments over ten years. It will open the market for independent retailers, boost domestic food production, and build a stronger, more affordable food system for all Canadians.

The strategy has four objectives:

- 1. Spur grocery store competition and create more choice for Canadians
- 2. Boost domestic food production across Canada
- 3. Grow fruits and vegetables year-round
- 4. Cut red tape across the agricultural supply chain

We hope everyone benefits, from farm to table:

- **Families** win with lower grocery prices, more choice, and more Canadian-grown food on the shelf.
- **Farmers** win with better prices, faster access to new farming tools, and more options to support generational family farms.
- **Independent grocers** win by teaming up to share costs like storage and transportation, instead of relying on big-chain wholesalers.
- **Manufacturers** win with more support to grow, innovate, and create jobs by processing more food here at home.
- **Growers** win with the tools to grow more fruits and vegetables year-round, lowering costs and cutting reliance on imports.

Canada’s new **National Food Security Strategy** puts Canadians back in control of what we grow, of what we buy, and of what we put on our tables. That is part of what we are transforming fundamentally to address affordability in the long run.

Keeping Communities Safe

How Our Bail and Sentencing Reforms
Are Making A Difference

Our government promised stricter bail and tougher sentences. That promise became law and came into force on July 15, 2026.

The Bail and Sentencing Reform Act includes over 80 changes to the Criminal Code, making bail harder to obtain for repeat and violent offenders, and imposing tougher sentences for serious crimes like home invasion, auto theft, extortion, human trafficking, and sexual assault.

These reforms also provide stronger tools for police and the courts to respond to real concerns people are raising in BC and across Canada and ensure stronger consequences for those who put our communities at risk.

Shaped by extensive consultations and close collaboration with partners across the country, these reforms were backed by premiers from every province and territory, as well as mayors and law enforcement who called for the Bill’s swift passage.

This is only a small part of our work to build a safer Canada. We are also investing in security for vulnerable groups, cracking down on ghost guns and illegal firearms smuggling, and supporting preventive measures for youth at risk of gang involvement.

Investing in Future Generations

Writing Canada’s Sporting History

Canada is writing a new chapter in its sporting history. This summer, Canada’s men’s national team achieved five historic firsts at the FIFA World Cup: a point, a tournament win, advancement to the knockout stage, a knockout round victory, and an appearance in the Round of 16, milestones that reflect the work of generations of Canadian players and coaches.

To build on that momentum, our government is investing \$755 million through the Spring Economic Update to expand access to sports, strengthen community connections, and maximize existing and new infrastructure, supporting the world-class athletes who inspire national pride. We’ve also announced up to \$9.8 million for the Canada Soccer National Training Centre, supporting the planning and design of a permanent home for soccer in Canada.

Cut Along This Line

B.C.’s New National Marine Conservation Area Reserve



B.C.’s Central Coast is one of Canada’s most biodiverse marine ecosystems, home to salmon, sea otters, and whales. Our government recently signed a historic agreement with six First Nations and the Province of B.C. to establish a new National Marine Conservation Area Reserve named Mia-yaltwa Ha’lidzogm hoon. This protects thousands of kilometres along B.C.’s central coast, contributing to our goal of protecting 30% of Canada’s waters by 2030 and ensuring these waters thrive for generations to come.

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
